#### Saint of the Month

November 3 is the feast of Saint Malachy of Armagh (c.1094-1148), who is also the diocesan patron of Down and Connor. He is an important saint with a European-wide reputation and one who enjoyed the friendship of the great Saint Bernard of Clairvaux. Malachy's influence in Irish ecclesiastical affairs has been compared with that of Boniface in Germany. During three years at Armagh, as Bernard of Clairvaux writes, Malachy restored the discipline of the church, grown lax during the intruded rule of a series of lay-abbots, and had the Roman Liturgy adopted. Malachy worked zealously to restore ecclesiastical discipline, restored marriage, renewed the practices of confession and confirmation, and introduced Roman chants in the liturgy. He was also known for his care to the needy as a miracle worker and healer. In his lifetime, he planted apple trees throughout Ireland during time of famine.

Bernard continues: Having extirpated barbarism and re-established Christian morals, and seeing all things tranquil, Malachy began to think of his own peace. He therefore resigned the Sees of Armagh and Connor, in 1136 or 1137, but retained as Bishop of Down. He founded a priory of Austin Canons at Downpatrick, and was unceasing in his episcopal labours. Early in 1139 he journeyed to Rome, via Scotland, England, and France, visiting Bernard at Clairvaux, Champagne. He petitioned Pope Innocent II for pallia for the Sees of Armagh and Cashel, and was appointed legate for Ireland. On his return visit to Clairvaux he obtained five monks for a foundation in Ireland, under Christian, an Irishman, as superior: thus arose the great Abbey of Mellifont in 1142. Malachy set out on a second journey to Rome in 1148, but on arriving at Clairvaux, he fell sick and died in the arms of Bernard, on 2 November 1148.

Originating in 1919 when President Woodrow Wilson marked a year since the end of the First World War, the day coincides with other days of remembrance around the world including Armistice Day in the United Kingdom and Remembrance Day across the Commonwealth of Nations. Not to be confused with Memorial Day, which honors those who died while in service, Veterans Day honors all military veterans, including the living.

#### 1919 President Wilson



## Big Bertha (17 March 1945 – 31 December 1993)

The Irish Droimeann cow, Big Bertha, was a record breaker in more ways than one. She



holds the Guinness World Record for the oldest ever cow, having lived to the grand old age of 49; Bertha died in 1993 and hasn't been outlived by another cow yet. She also gave birth to 39 calves in her lifetime, the most number of calves ever produced by a single cow.

Jerome O'Leary from Sneem in Co. Kerry bought Bertha as a calf, and was very proud of her achievements, which extended further than just age and calf production by the way. Due to her record-breaking status, Big Bertha became a local celebrity. Her appearances at cattle fairs helped raise \$75,000 for cancer research and other charities, and she would lead the St Patrick's Day parade in Sneem to aid with fundraising. Before her appearances at the noisy parades, O'Leary would feed Big Bertha whiskey to steady her nerves

Bertha received a fine Irish send-off when she died, on New Year's Eve 1993, a wake was held for her in the local pub, the Blackwater Tavern at Raycoslough in County Kerry. On Big Bertha's death, O'Leary still had several of her offspring in his herd, the oldest of whom was then 35. Her death made national and international news. And even though she's not with us anymore, her legend lives on – she was stuffed after her death, so you can actually pay her a visit.

She even has her own brand of gin called Bertha's Revenge.



## Iustitia, Lady Justice, Dublin Castle

Stair na hÉireann | History of Ireland

Iustitia, more commonly known as Lady Justice, situated over one of the gates that gives access to the central courtyard of Dublin Castle.



The statue was erected by the British authorities in 1751 and was sculpted by Van Nost. Its design was a source of outrage and amusement for many in Dublin city, for it betrays many of the characteristics that statues of this type normally exhibit.

Lady Justice is often pictured blindfolded, so as to be blind to discrimination. Here she is fully able to see. Her scales, normally depicted as being perfectly leveled are actually tilted to the Revenue office. The sword she carries, which frequently points downwards (though not always), is held upright and she gazes at it with a smile on her face.

Her position on the building is what drew most attention to the statue. While statues of this kind can be found on government buildings all over the world, the majority of these statues faces out over the city and its people. Only in Dublin castle does she face inward to the courtyard, turning her back on the people of the city. This obscure positioning of the statue gave rise to the saying: "The Statue of Justice, mark well her station, her face to the castle and her arse to the nation!"

# Sister Eileen Houlihan of Monroe Immaculate Heart of Mary celebrated her 100th birthday on October 27, 2022



She was born at home in Detroit in 1922. Her father was born in County Clare, Ireland. As an 18-year-old young man, he immigrated to Detroit and moved into the rooming house his older sister, Mary, operated. Her father worked odd jobs until he acclimated. Once established and married to Eileen's mother, he joined the Detroit Police Department. He remained a police officer until he retired.

There were eight siblings in Sister Eileen's family. Of the eight, there were two sets of twins. Eileen's older Sister, Kathleen, was a twin and two years older than Eileen. She joined the Monroe Immaculate Heart of Mary congregation after high school, while Eileen joined the IHMs two weeks after her 1940 graduation from

St. Mary of Redford in Detroit. A third sister joined the Franciscan order of nuns.



After her first profession in 1943, Sister Eileen attended Marygrove College where, in 1945, she earned a bachelor's degree in music. She began teaching studio music and boys choir at St. Matthew Elementary School on Detroit's east side. She taught full-time during the year and spent summers pursuing her master's degree in Liturgy at the University of Notre Dame. In 1954, she received her degree.

Along the way, Sister Eileen had various ministries. One of her favorites was the eight years she spent teaching at her old high school, St. Mary of Redford, at the same time her mother worked there. Her happiest time was at Our Lady of Lake Huron Parish in Harbor Beach, Michigan, where she served for 15 years. That opportunity came about when she called Father Tom McNamara,

whom she knew from an assignment in Saginaw. Father Tom was now ministering there. He was delighted to get her call and welcomed her. She loved being close to Lake Huron, the beauty of the water and found joy in her teaching and ministry. She was responsible for the entire parish in her final three years there, stepping in for a critically ill priest.

In January 2004, Sister Eileen retired and returned to the Motherhouse in Monroe. She is grateful for the life she has. She has been able to travel to Ireland to see her father's homeland three times with her sisters. She learned to drive, and she and Kathleen became travelers with a special affinity for roads, driving wherever they needed until Kathleen died and Eileen's eyesight began to fade. She loves to read large print books and has read all the available volumes in the library. You will see her initials in each book if you check the sign-out logs. She often checks there to see if she has read the book in the past.

When asked if she is looking forward to her birthday, she says, "I never thought I'd live this long." Sister Eileen is happy women have more choices and glad she can now wear pants. She said those habits were beautiful, but ridiculously hot. One had to lift the scapular to get any air against the skin and cool down a bit. She was happy when the beautiful blue habits were refashioned into skirts and suit jackets. She keeps close contact with her youngest sister, a youthful 89 years, and they talk on the phone a couple of times a week.
