What is Ash Wednesday?

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. Lent is the forty days (excluding Sundays) leading up to Easter. The number forty is significant as it refers to Jesus' forty days in the desert prior to beginning his ministry of teaching.

On Ash Wednesday, Catholics and some other Christian denominations receive ashes in the shape of a cross on their forehead or sprinkled on top of their head. These ashes are created from the palms used during the previous year's Palm Sunday Mass. They symbolize penance, which is appropriate as Lent is a season of penance, and remind us of our own mortality. During the Mass, as the priest or lay minister applies the ashes, he says "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return." Anyone who attends a Mass or prayer service can receive ashes, not just practicing Catholics.

The 5:30 Mass on Ash Wednesday (Valentines Day) at the Historic Church of St. Patrick will be offered up for Eileen Collins Frazer on the third anniversary of her passing. 2/14/2021 In ár gcroíthe go deo (In our hearts forever)

The Legend of Saint Valentine

Spring, formerly held on February 15th. It consisted of different ceremonies dedicated to Rome's founders (Romulus and Remus) and the Roman God of Agriculture (Faunus).

On February 14th, about 498 A.D., Pope Gelasius ordered the day to be known as Valentine's Day, overriding the earlier pagan ceremonies. Since then, we've been formally celebrating Valentine's Day.



ST. BRIGID'S FEAST DAY ~ FEBRUARY 1st

St. Brigid's Feast Day marks the traditional beginning of Spring in Ireland according to the Celtic calendar, February 1st was originally celebrated as a pagan festival called Imbolc, marking the midpoint between the winter equinox and spring solstice, and the arrival of longer, warmer days.



2024, Ireland will mark the 1,500th anniversary of St Brigid's passing with a special program of events nationwide. The Brigid 1500 Festival in Co Kildare will celebrate the extraordinary life and legacy of St. Brigid from January 27 - February 6, 2024.

St. Brigid is one of the most revered saints in Irish history and is the patron saint of Ireland, along with St. Patrick and St. Colmcille. According to legend, St. Brigid was born in Ireland in the 5th century and went on to become a powerful religious leader, known for her kindness and generosity. Brigid is a Catholic and Orthodox saint. She was a pupil of St. Patrick and became famous for

her kindness, mercy, and her miracles. In addition, Brigitte founded Ireland's most famous mixed (male and female) monastery in County Kildare. In The Life of Brigid, her biographer, Cogitosus, recorded that Brigid formed an alliance with the hermit Conleth and, together, they created a double monastery from the Early Christian tradition. She was abbess and he was bishop. Within 100 years of her death, there was a thriving, egalitarian monastery of men and women, living and practicing their spirituality equally, side by side.

Perhaps the most famous story about St. Brigid surrounds the legend of her cloak. When Brigid was refused by the King of Leinster the land to build a convent, she asked if she could have as much land as her cloak would cover. The King allowed this, but was surprised to see Brigid's cloak grow and grow, as four of her friends took a corner each and walked pulled the cloak to cover many acres. The King then granted St. Brigid the land, and any other supplies she required, before converting to Christianity soon after.

This year in Ireland, St. Brigid's Day is also celebrated on February 5th as a bank holiday. This means that most businesses and government offices will be closed, and many people will have the day off work. This provides a great opportunity for families and friends to gather together and celebrate the holiday. The holiday is celebrated in a variety of ways, but one of the most common traditions is the making of St. Brigid's crosses. These crosses are made from rushes or straw and are believed to bring good luck and protection to the home. They are typically hung above doorways or in windows. The "Brat Bhride" or "Brigid's Blanket" was placed outside at sunset on the eve of St. Brigid's Day, February 1st, and brought back inside before sunrise. It was understood that the dew that fell that night imbued the fabric with healing and protective powers for the entire year.

Brigid the Goddess



At the same time, the legends about Saint Brigid echo the myths and legends about the three-faced Celtic fertility goddess Brigid - the goddess of war, poetry, crafts, and healing. It is worth noting that before the arrival of Christianity in Ireland, the feast of the goddess Brigid was also celebrated on February 1st, the first day of Spring in the Celtic calendar. Brigid was a goddess full of contradiction. She was a goddess of healing, fertility, and motherhood, but also of passion and fire. Further complicating matters, Brigid was a god-dess of serenity and water as well. Evidence of her worship has been found throughout

Ireland, reflecting her importance as a powerful, yet personal deity. When she was not protecting mothers and newborn children, Brigid inspired many of the writers and poets for which Ireland is internationally renowned.

Shrove Tuesday: The history of Pancake Day in Ireland

Shrove Tuesday, also known as Pancake Day, is a traditional Irish holiday celebrated on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. It is a day of feasting and celebration before the start of Lent. The word 'Shrove' comes from the Middle English word 'shrive', which means to confess one's sins and receive absolution. Traditionally, people used this day as a preparation for the Lenten fast.



The history of Shrove Tuesday in Ireland is rooted in tradition and folklore, with a range of customs and beliefs associated with it. From the traditional pancake race to the superstitions surrounding the eating of pancakes, it is a day of joy and abundance enjoyed by people of all ages!

The tradition of Shrove Tuesday in Ireland dates back to the Middle Ages. In those days, people would visit their local church and receive absolution for their sins. This was known

The remarkable life of Sister Ann: A nun like no other

MY first memory of my cousin, Ann O'Halloran, is seeing her clad in black leather, riding on the back of her boyfriend's BSA bike while speeding past Cork City Hall. She was 16. It was the mid-1950s, and she was about as far away from a nun as you could imagine. But two years later, Sister Ann did indeed join holy orders. It was a decision that led to a remarkable career as a nun and teacher that earned her love and respect across the USA, South America and Africa. A passionate advocate of peace, Ann even riled parts of the establishment when she went on an 11-day hunger strike in support of dying IRA hunger striker Bobby Sands in 1981. Truly, she was a nun like no other...

Ann O'Halloran was born in Cork city on July 6, 1941, one of five children, who included her brother John, the 1966 Cork All-Ireland winning hurler. She joined the international Religious of the Sacred Heart of Mary (RSHM) in 1959 after graduating from the Marymount School in Neuilly, France, and was posted to a semi-



cloistered order in Tarrytown, New York Her timing was good. A year later, Pope John XXIII convened Vatican II and ordered the Church and religious orders to open their doors and go out as Jesus did to live among the poor. Ann needed no encouragement, at a time when civil rights and anti-war movements were rising up. She befriended the top New York journalists of their time, Pulitzer-winning Jimmy Breslin and Pete Hamill, both of whom had Irish roots. Through them, she met the Berrigan brothers, pacifist priests who led opposition to the Vietnam War.

I picture her then, in the early 1970s, a petite, pretty 30-year-old. It is a hot summer's evening and she is walking alone through the run-down streets of Harlem. Her worn blue shoes are flat, she's dressed in a calf-length dark skirt and matching cotton jacket. Her hair is tucked under a beige cloth cap pulled low on her forehead. Ann's life work was simple: help, educate and empower the poor wherever she found them. She did that in New York, in the jungles of South America, and in Africa, carrying out the words of the RSHM Mission Statement: "The challenge of the gospel and the spirit of faith and zeal which marked our founding Sisters, urge us to respond to the needs of our time and to work with others in action for evangelical justice."

Under her adopted name Sister Rosaleen, Ann furthered her education. After receiving a BA degree from Marymount College and an MA in Anthropology from the New School for Social Research in New York, she volunteered to teach in South America. In 1964, Ann arrived, fluent in Spanish, at the Marymount School in Bogotá, Colombia. It was a febrile time. The FARC revolutionaries had just formed into a military force and clashed openly with the Government and the Catholic Church's teaching. Young Ann worked amid these so-cial upheavals as an advocate for the poor around her. With the help of river guides, she and her religious colleagues frequently ventured by boat into the jungle interiors with food, water, and the Holy Eucharist to administer to fleeing civilians and rebels alike. They were perilous times in Colombia, religious personnel were targets for kidnappings, murder, and intimidation. In 1968, the RSHM order closed its Marymount Schools in the country, evacuating the nuns to the U.S.

Back in New York, Ann resumed her educational ministry and taught in its dangerous, deprived neighborhoods. The people trusted and confided in her. She was invited into their lives and bore witness to their family celebrations, setbacks and despairs. She rallied politicians, lawmakers, educators, journalists, captains of industry, and the Catholic hierarchy, to assist her. Ann loved the spirit and resilience of Harlem's black women. She told me of the poor mother who had rented furniture for an Easter weekend when her family visited from North Carolina. She wanted them to think she was doing well. The furniture would be returned next morning. When Ann asked her how she kept her spirits up in the face of such challenges, she replied: "Sister Rosaleen, I refuse to be unhappy."

Ann died on November 7, 2021. She was a warrior - and her name was Sister Rosaleen. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a hanam dílis.
