

April Dates in Irish History

April 1, 1848 - Augustus Saint-Gaudens, sculptor, is born in Dublin

April 1, 1911 - The Titanic is launched in Belfast

April 4, 1774 - Death of Oliver Goldsmith

April 4, 1994 - Riverdance appears for the first time at the Eirovosion contest Dublin

April 5, 1961 - Death of Oscar-winning Irish actor of stage and screen Barry Fitzgerald. Born in Dublin in 1888, he pursues an acting career at the Abbey Theatre and then heads for Hollywood where he becomes Paramount's resident Irishman in such films as "Going My Way" for which he won a Best Supporting Actor Oscar. His finest works are under director John Ford, including "How Green Was My Valley" and "The Quiet Man."

April 10, 1998 - The Northern Ireland peace talks end with an historic agreement. The accord - dubbed the Good Friday Agreement - is reached after nearly two years of talks and 30 years of conflict.

April 7, 1927 - The worldos first ever paid television broadcast takes place. An Irishman, Mr. A. Dolan was employed by the American Telephone and Telegraph company to provide a %chort act of monologue and song the Interestingly, the first professional artist to be seen on television in Britain, a year later, was Irish singer Peg O'Neil

April 14, 1848 - In Dublin, the tricolor national flag of Ireland is presented to the public for the first time by Thomas Francis Meagher and the Young Ireland Party

April 15, 1912 - The Titanic sinks on her maiden voyage with the loss of 1,513 souls, many of them Irish; 732 survive

April 23, 1014 - The Dublin Norse and the king of Leinster, with Viking allies from overseas, are defeated by Brian Boru's army at Clontarf. Brian, now an old man, is killed. This thwarts the potential domination of Ireland by the Norse, but they are well established in the coastal towns, and will continue to have a major influence. Máel Sechnaill succeeds Brian as high king

April 24, 1916 - On Easter Monday, the Irish Volunteers and Citizen Army seize the General Post Office (GPO) in Dublin and demand Irish sovereignty

April 25, 1861 - William Ford, who crossed the Atlantic from Ireland by steerage, marries fellow country woman Mary O'Hern. Their son Henry Ford, pioneered the mass manufacturing of the automobile

April 27, 1891 - The first ever Irish musical comedy, The Irish Girl, written by Percy French and Dr. W. Houston Collisson, is staged at the Queency Theatre, Dublin

April 29, 1916 - Pearse orders surrender of the Easter Rising rebels on this date. Approximately 64 rebels have been killed, 132 crown forces, and 230 civilians. 2,500 people have been wounded; the centre of Dublin has been devastated by the shelling

Poulnabrone Dolman



Situated on the high Burren limestone plateau, Poulnabrone Dolmen is one of Ireland most iconic archaeological monuments and is the second most visited location in the Burren after the Cliffs of Moher. It is the oldest dated megalithic monument in Ireland. It is one of over 70 megalithic

tombs located in The Burren in Co. Clare. With a name that literally means 'The hole of the sorrowsø Poulnabrone features a capstone which sits on two 6ft high portal stones to create a chamber. It was excavated in 1968 and found to contain the remains of "between 16 and 22 adults and 6 juveniles, including a newborn baby".

The dolmen consists of a twelve-foot, thin, slab-like, tabular capstone (horizontal) supported by two sets of slender upright (vertical) parallel portal stones, which support the capstone 6 ft from the ground, creating a chamber in a 30 ft low cairn. The cairn helped stabilize the tomb chamber, and would have been no higher during the Neolithic. The entrance faces north and is crossed by a low sill stone.

A crack was discovered in the eastern portal stone in 1985. Following the resulting collapse, the dolmen was dismantled, and the cracked stone was replaced. Excavations during that time (1986, 1988) found that 33 people, both adults and children, were buried under the monument. Personal items buried with the dead included a polished stone axe, a bone pendant, quartz crystals, weapons and pottery.

There were no intact skeletons, indicating the site was not used as a burial place in the sense that bodies were placed there immediately after or even close to the time of death. Bones were found in the original strata, but jumbled chronologically, so they were not buried sequentially. Only one of the adults seems to have lived past 40 and many of the bones showed signs of arthritis in the upper body. The children had teeth showing signs of illness and malnutrition. Two of the bodies displayed injuries: a skull and rib cage with depressed fractures, healed before death, and an adult male hip bone, pierced by the tip of a stone projectile and not healed, which means the injury occurred not much before the time of death. Those selected for deposit at this site were apparently the members of some sort of elite. Their bodies were left elsewhere to decompose, in a protected location, as none of the bones show any signs of teeth marks. Only the bare bones were then taken here and deposited. As some of them show scorch marks, they may have been ritually purified by fire beforehand.

According to Radiocarbon dating, the tomb was likely used between 3,800 and 3,200 BC. The findings are now at the Clare Museum, Ennis

The man thanked the boy kindly, complimented him on how bright he was and said, "I'm the new pastor in town. If you and your mommy come to church on Sunday, Iøl show you how to get to Heaven." The little boy replied with a chuckle; "You're kidding me, right? You can't even find the Post Office!"

Tell me, Patrick, how did you manage to get so very drunk last night?" asked the parish priest. "Well you see, Father, it was like this. I got into very bad company after winning a bottle of whiskey at a raffle." "But you were with Mick Mulligan, Sean O'Toole, and Peter Ryan and they don't drink." "That's what I mean, Father..."

Paddy was forced to take a day off from work to appear for a minor traffic summons. He grew increasingly restless as he waited hour after endless hour for his case to be heard. When his name was called late in the afternoon, he stood before the judge, only to hear that court would be adjourned for the day and he would have to return the next day. King Brian of Ireland murdered by Vikings April 23, 1014



Brian Boru, the high king of Ireland, is assassinated by a group of retreating Norsemen shortly after his Irish forces defeated them. After his death, his body was taken to Swords, Co. Dublin for the wake and then to Armagh to be buried. His tomb is said to be in the north wall of St Patrick's Cathedral in the city of Armagh Back then, the Christian Church in Ireland was centered, not around the bishops of diocese and archbishops of archdiocese, but rather around monasteries headed by powerful abbots who were members of the royal dynasties of the lands in

which their monasteries resided. Among the most important monasteries was Armagh, located in the Province of Ulster. It is recorded in the 'Book of Armagh' that, in the year 1005, Brian donated twenty-two ounces of gold to the monastery and declared that Armagh was the religious capital of Ireland. The origins of the cathedral are related to the construction in 445 of a stone church on the Druim Saileach (Willow Ridge) hill by St. Patrick, around which a monastic community developed. The church was historically the center of the Roman Catholic Church in Ireland, but was given to the Protestant Church of Ireland by the British government during the Irish Reformation.

The line between Irish Legend and Irish Myth has often been blurred, especially as the retelling of heroic deeds has been passed on through generations. Brian Boru was no legend although his life deeds were legendary. He was very much a real man and was in fact the last great High King of Ireland and perhaps the greatest military leader the country has ever known.

Brian, a clan prince, seized the throne of the southern Irish state of Dal Cais from its Eogharacht rulers in 963. He subjugated all of Munster, extended his power over all of southern Ireland, and in 1002 became the high king of Ireland. Unlike previous high kings of Ireland, Brian resisted the rule of Ireland Norse invaders, and after further conquests his rule was acknowledged across most of Ireland. As his power increased, relations with the Norsemen on the Irish coast grew increasingly strained. In 1013, Sitric, king of the Dublin Norse, formed an alliance against Brian, featuring Viking warriors from Ireland, the Hebrides, the Orkneys, and Iceland, as well as soldiers of Brian native Irish enemies.

On April 23, 1014, Good Friday, forces under Brian son Murchad met and annihilated the Viking coalition at the Battle of Clontarf, near Dublin. After the battle, a small group of Norsemen, flying from their defeat, stumbled on Brian tent, overcame his bodyguards, and murdered the elderly king. Victory at Clontarf broke Norse power in Ireland forever, but Ireland largely fell into anarchy after the death of Brian. After his death and the death of one of his sons, his remaining sons, Tadg and Donnchad, were unable to assume the kingship which was assumed by Mael Sechnaill. He died in 1022 after which the role of High King of Ireland became more of a position in name only, rather than that of a powerful ruler. Brian Boru was, therefore, the last great High King of Ireland.

This fun looking couple are my grandparents, John P. Collins and Margaret (Buckley) Collins from Mullintoura, County Cork Ireland. John, born in 1866, was the oldest of seven brothers. His six brothers came to Toledo. Patrick, Cornelius (Con), Lawrence (Lar), Edward and twins, William and Michael, who both died tragically a few days after arriving in Toledo. Uncle Lar, came by way of Wales. John died in 1948 and Margaret died in 1947. Rest in Peace.




This brother, Cornelius (Uncle Con) was the seventh son (which some people claim made him special). Cons education consisted of elementary school in Ireland. At the age of 14, he went to work in a blacksmiths shop in Ireland, learning the trade. In 1900, at the age of 19, he left Ireland and came to Toledo and set up a blacksmith shop near the corner of Monroe and Collingwood. By 1915, Con decided that the future of being a blacksmith was limited. So on November 1, 1915 he entered the real estate field opening the C.C. Collins Realty Company at 567 Spitzer Building. Eventually, he also sold Insurance. He became a wealthy man, sponsoring my father, one Aunt and three uncles to America. He

also helped many relatives of his wife, Mary (Callahan) to get started in this country. He was my Godfather and his handshake let you know that he was originally a blacksmith. Uncle Con died on Jan. 9, 1953 Rest in Peace.

John and Margaret Collins had seven children, Five sons and two daughters. Two sons, Jack and William remained in Ireland as did one daughter, Elizabeth. Three sons, Patrick, Michael and Maurice and one daughter, Ellie came to Toledo. Michael son, D. Michael Collins and Ellie Ruddys nephew, John McHugh were both elected Mayor of Toledo. Both former Mayors died in 2015. May they all Rest in Peace.
