Summer solstice 2021 in Northern Hemisphere will be at 11:31 PM on Sunday, June 20



It is the longest day for the Northern Hemisphere. Shortest day for the Southern Hemisphere. the Sun travels the longest path through the sky, and that day therefore has the most daylight. When the Simmer Solstice happens in the Northern Hemisphere, the North Pole is tilted about 23.4° (23°27′) toward the Sun.

Summer Solstice celebrations date back to ancient Ireland, over 5,000 years ago and it's still celebrated today! In order to banish any evil spirits that might harm their crops, the ancient Irish would light bonfires. Traditionally bonfires were lit in celebration atop the sacred hills of Ireland, the most important being on The Hill of Tara, the ancient seat of the High Kings of Ireland. This was a time of singing, dancing and feasting. It was

customary for lovers to clasp hands and jump over bonfires. This was thought to bring luck to their relationship.

IMPORTANT JUNE DATES IN IRISH HISTORY

June 9, 2001 - Cetacean experts head for Cork harbor after the arrival of three stocky killer whales in the estuary. The black Orcas with distinctive white markings create a huge stir in the Cobh area where the promenade is lined with people from early afternoon until near darkness as the whales circled the waters

June 9 ~ today is the feast day of St Columcille, one of the spiritual giants of the early Christian church, and one of Irelands three patron saints. Born in Donegal, he founded the city of Derry ô it was originally called Doiré Colmcille ô and went on to establish many monasteries including Iona, the centre from which Scotland was converted to Christianity.

June 13, 1886 - Molly Malone reputedly "dies of the fever". The famous song, "Sweet Molly Malone" is a tribute to the memory of a real person who was a fishwife selling cockles and mussels in the streets of Dublin. A statue representing Molly Malone was unveiled on Grafton Street by then Lord Mayor of Dublin, Ben Briscoe, during the 1988 Dublin Millennium celebrations, when 13 June was declared to be Molly Malone Day. In July 2014, the statue was relocated to Suffolk Street, in front of the Tourist Information Office, to make way for Luas track-laying work at the old location.

June 13, 1865 - Birth of W.B. Yeats in Dublin

June 16, 1904 - Today was when James Joyce had his first date with Nora Barnacle; ultimately, it became the date on which everything takes place in his masterpiece, Ulysses



June 17, 2008 - More than 1200 people bare all at Blarney Castle in Cork for a naked photo shoot by the US photographer Spencer Tunick. õDare to Bareö is part of the Cork Midsummer Festival and proves a stunning success with the turnout taking even the most optimistic of the organizers aback.




June 23 1704 - The Registration Act comes into force requiring all Catholic priests in Ireland to register in court, to furnish two £50 bonds for good behavior, and not to leave the county in which they are registered

June 28, 1922 - The Provisional Government of the Irish Free State bombards the Four Courts in Dublin, and the Civil War begins

June 29, 1969 - Ireland enacts exemption from income tax for creators of works of 'cultural or artistic merit'

St Colmcille – the Irish patron saint who was banished from Ireland for starting a tribal war

His feast day is June 9, the day he died in the year 597 AD ó at the impressive age of 75. Colmcille was born on December 7, 521 in Gartan, near Lough Gartan in Co. Donegal. He was also known as Columba, a Latin version of Colum. The 'cille' suffix that was added to the end of his name means 'of the churches'.

On his father's side, he was great-grandson of the famed Niall of the Nine Hostages ó an Irish high king of the 5th century. The modern day Donegal village of Glencolmcille is named in his honor. St Colm-

cille is also the patron saint of the city of Derry ó where he founded a monastic settlement in 540 AD.

A young Colmcille entered the priesthood at the age of 20 when he became a pupil at Clonard Abbey, situated on the River Boyne in modern day Co. Meath. When a prince cousin gave him some land at Derry, he decided to start his own monastery. This allowed him to travel throughout Northern Ireland teaching the pagans about Christianity. Colmcille founded some 30 monasteries in just 10 years, inspiring many people with his personal holiness. Nevertheless, Colmcille was no angel. His strong personality and forceful preaching ruffled feathers and in 563 AD he was accused of starting a war between two Irish tribes.

After the death of Prince Curnan of Connaught ó who Colmcille was meant to protect ó a number of clerics and scholars threatened to excommunicate him. Instead, Colmcille was sentenced by the high king never to see Ireland again, and was exiled to Scotland with 12 companions. He settled on a bleak Scottish island called Iona where he would spend most of his remaining years.

In 575 Colmcille was persuaded to visit Ireland to mediate a dispute between the high king and the league of poets. Insisting on remaining faithful to the terms of his exile, that he never —seeø Ireland again, he traveled blindfolded. His considerable reputation was respected by everyone in Ireland. He spoke to the assembled nobles and clergy with such force and authority that the king was persuaded to calm hostilities.

Colmcille spent the rest of his life on Iona praying, fasting, and teaching his monks to read and copy the Scriptures. He was a renowned iman of lettersø, wrote several hymns and has been credited with having transcribed over 300 books and manuscripts. Colmcille died on Iona and was buried in 597 by his monks in the abbey he created. In 794 the Vikings descended on Iona and plundered much of the relics Colmcille had procured in his life.

On August 22, 565, St Colmcille is said to have encountered the Loch Ness Monster ó which has been interpreted as the first ever reference to the mythical Scottish beast. Traveling in Scotland, Columba had to cross Loch Ness, but Nessie had other ideas. Raising his hand to make the sign of the cross, Colmcille commanded the beast, saying, "You will go no further, and won't touch the man; go back at once." At the voice of the saint, the monster fled as if terrified, "more quickly than if it had been pulled back with ropes.ö The local pagans were amazed and converted to Christianity based on the miracle.

A number of miracles have been attributed to St Colmcille ó such as healing people with diseases, expelling malignant spirits, subduing wild beasts, calming storms, and even returning the dead to life. He is also said to have performed agricultural miraclesøthat would hold a special significance to the common people of Ireland and the British Isles, such as when he caste a demon out of a pail and restored spilt milk to its container.

Francis Edward Ledwidge (19 August 1887 ó 31 July 1917) was an Irish war poet and soldier from County Meath. Sometimes known as the "poet of the blackbirds", he was killed in action at the Battle of Passchendaele during World War I.

DID YOU KNOW?

In Ireland, many place names can trace their origins to Gaelic names. Including a river in Galway called **Sruf-faunoughterluggatoora** and **Muckanaghederdauhaulia** holds the longest name for a town in Ireland, Co. Galway.

Montgomery Street in Dublin was once the largest red-light district in all of Europe.

The Man Who Inspired Father's Day Was a Single Dad and a Civil War Vet William Jackson Smart was a twice-married, twice-widowed father of 14 children.

William Jackson Smart was a twice-married, twice-widowed Civil War veteran and father of 14 children, one of whom dedicated her life to the creation of Fatherøs Day in honor of her devoted and selfless dad.

The story goes that Williamøs daughter, Sonora Smart Dodd, was attending one of the first official Motherøs Day services in 1909 at her church in Spokane, Washington, when she had an epiphanyô if mothers deserved a day in honor of their loving service, why not fathers?

When Sonora was 16, her mother Ellen died, leaving William as a single father to Sonora and her five younger brothers. And by Sonoraøs account, he performed brilliantly. õI remember everything about him,ö Sonora said many years later to the Spokane Daily Chronicle. õHe was both father and mother to me and my brothers and sisters.ö

Sonoraøs mother Ellen, herself a widow, had three children from a previous marriage. On top of that, William had also been married and widowed before he met Sonoraøs mother. William had five children with his first wife, Elizabeth, who were already grown when William became a widower for the second time.

In 1910, Sonora brought a petition before the Spokane Ministerial Alliance to recognize the courage and devotion of all fathers like William on June 5, her dadøs birthday. The local clergy liked the idea of a special Fatherøs Day service, but couldnøt pull something together so quickly, so they settled for June 19, the third Sunday in June.

On that first Father Day in 1910, church sermons across Spokane were dedicated to dear old dad, red and white roses were passed out in honor of living and deceased fathers, the mayor of Spokane and governor of Washington issued proclamations, and Sonora found her calling. She would spend much of the next 60 years pushing for the official recognition of Father Day as a national holiday.

HAPPY FATHER'S DAY



"The Celtic tree of life is the Oaktree. It was the most sacred tree of all, which represented the centre of the world. The Celtic name for oak, Daur, is the origin of the word door- the root of the oak tree was literally the doorway to the Otherworld, the realm of Fairy."

The Celtic tree of life (in Irish Crann Bethadh)

The Tree of Life symbol represents life and how as we move through life our knowledge, experience and wisdom grows just as the tree does, becoming stronger every day. The tree of life symbolizes the forces of nature are coming together in perfect harmony to maintain balance in the universe.

Countless Irish legends revolve around trees. One could fall asleep next to a particular tree and awake in the fairy realm. The Celts derived the meaning of rebirth from the seasonal changes they would see each tree go through (Summer to Winter and so on). Rituals were often performed on the basis of birth and death and rebirth.

It was believed that the roots of the tree penetrated depths of the lower world, branches of the tree reached out and stretched out to the heavens, and the trunk remains on the earth plain.

It was believed that the tree was able to bless people with prosperity. The towering height of Oak trees is associated with qualities such as endurance and nobility. Basically, the bigger the tree the more fertile the land and the more the settlement would thrive from.

The Oak tree is also known to attract lightning, this characteristic of the tree is considered to be of great importance by celts and in Celtic symbols.

It is known that when a new settlement was formed in Ireland, a tree was planted in the middle of the plantation known as Crann Bethadh (basically meaning Tree of Life) The Celts believed that their enemies would be rendered powerless if their sacred tree was cut down.
