Reek Sunday in Ireland July 25, 2021



Reek Sunday, also known as Garland Sunday, is an annual day of pilgrimage in Ireland that occurs on the last Sunday in July. On this day, pilgrims climb Croagh Patrick, a mountain in County Mayo associated with Saint Patrick.

The name õCroagh Patrickö means õPatrick's stacksö. Before the introduction of Christianity, the mountain had been a site of pagan pilgrimage. It was originally known as Cruachán Aigle, this name is mentioned in a number of early Irish texts.

According to legend, Saint Patrick climbed this mountain and fasted on its summit for forty days of Lent. Since then, Croagh Patrick has been drawing thousands of pilgrims who want to honor the primary patron saint of Ireland.

A total of 100,000 pilgrims climb Croagh Patrick every year, between 15,000 and 30,000 of them make their pilgrimage on Reek Sunday. The day of pilgrimage was named Reek Sunday because Croagh Patrick is nicknamed the Reek. The Reek Sunday climbing is traditionally led by the Archbishop of Tuam.

It takes about two hours to climb and an hour and a half to descend, although the exact time depends on weather conditions. Reek Sunday is one of the busiest days of the year for local rescue teams, as injuries occur every year

The ascent along the traditional pilgrim path begins from the north side of the mountain in the village of Murrisk. At the base of the mountain there is a small parking lot and a visitor center, as well as several stands selling religious items and that also rent walking sticks hewn from nearby trees. There is also a small pub near the base of the mountain, which is as full of locals as it is of pilgrims. Beyond the stands and sellers lay a set of stairs up to a statue of St. Patrick. On the last weekend in July this statue bore a sign with the schedule of masses to be celebrated atop the mountain all weekend. Some pilgrims recounted that, when they were children, their parents used to take them up the stairs as far as the statue and declare that they had, in fact, climbed the mountain. The statue more or less marks a boundary between civilization and the area that turns into more rugged mountain paths, and really stands as the beginning of the path.



IMPORTANT JULY DATES IN IRISH HISTORY

- July 2, 2000 The 25th anniversary of St. Oliver Plunkett's canonization is celebrated in Drogheda, Co. Armagh
- July 4, 1998 It is announced that outgoing US Ambassador Jean Kennedy-Smith is to be made an honorary Irish citizen in recognition of her contribution to the peace process
- July 5, 1838 The Board of Trinity College decrees the establishment of a Chair of Irish
- July 8, 1984 Two Irish-Americans slug it out on Wimbledon¢s centre court for the men¢s singles¢title John McEnroe beats Jimmy Connors
- July 9, 1921 A truce is reached between the IRA and the British army
- July 9, 1959 Mary Browne from Roscommon becomes the first Ban Garda woman police officer pounding the beat in Dublin
- July 11, 1921 Truce is declared between IRA and English forces, thus ending the War of Independence military campaign
- July 15, 1927 Countess Constance de Markievicz, Irish patriot, dies
- July 15, 1943 ó Maurice & Katie Collins become proud parents of their only son
- July 15, 1999 It's revealed that since 1998, all telephone, e-mail and fax messages between Ireland and Britain, and probably the United States, were tapped by the British Government
- July 17, 1846 Birth of Fenian, John McLure. He is one of 30 Fenian prisoners released in a general amnesty by the British government on January 5, 1871. They are released on condition that they exile themselves to the country of their choice and not return until their sentences have expired. Many choose to go to Australia, but John McClure, Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa, John Devoy, Henry Mulleda and Charles Underwood O'Connell, who had all been imprisoned together, decide to go to America and ship out from Liverpool on board the "Cuba." The so-called 'Cuba Five' arrive in New York to a hero's welcome and even receive a resolution of welcome from the US House of Representatives
- July 23, 1999- Guinness Blues Festival gets underway in 30 venues across Dublin
- July 25 Today is the feast day of St. James. Since mediaeval times, Dubliners held an annual drinking festival in the Saint honor. Fittingly, Guinness chose St. James Gate as the site for their brewery
- July 25, 1987 U2 plays in Cardiff, Wales, in response to a fan who gathered 10,000 signatures on a petition requesting the show
- July 31, 2007 After 38 years, the occupation of Northern Ireland by the British Army ends at midnight. Operation Banner is the Army's longest continuous campaign in its history with more than 300,000 personnel serving and 763 directly killed by paramilitaries.

The Clontygora Court Tomb

County Armagh



The Clontygora Court Tomb is locally known as :The King Ring and is situated on a prominent hillside in South Armagh. In Irish, this location translates to mean the meadow of the goats. The tomb has an odd Y shape and has a large burial gallery at its center. The roof slabs and the large capstone that covers its first 3 chambers are supported by enormous split granite boulders. These unusually face north (instead of east-west) probably towards the nearby stream. This area is known as The Ring of Gullion has been farmed for at least 6000 years and has 20 impressive megalithic tombs, burial chambers, and cairns. Over the recent past, there have been reports of re-constructive vandalism and it is incredible that this tomb survived. In the 18th century, it was reported

that some of the stones were removed to build the first lock on the Newry Canal, in the 19th-century they were used to build the quay at Narrow Water, and more recently to build field boundary walls! Clontygora means omeadow of the goatso in Irish.

The forecourt is the most impressive feature of the tomb and is defined by very large orthostats (upright stones). The tallest of these are near the center of the forecourt and stand over 9 ft. high. where funeral rites were performed before the ashes or bones of the dead person were taken through the entrance, marked by two massive portal stones, to be placed inside the burial gallery. This forecourt may have been used for other ceremonies as well as for burial ritual.

Roof slabs and a large capstone over the first of three chambers are supported on enormous split granite boulders. The ruined burial gallery consists of at least two, probably three, chambers lined with similarly large sidestones and some roofing slabs still survive though displaced. Very little remains of the stone



cairn which once would have covered the tomb. The first burial chamber is quite well preserved and is 3.28 yards wide. Stone has been robbed from the second chamber, and also from a third chamber, leaving it with no existing surface remains at all. Evidence of this third chamber was revealed only by excavation in 1937. The below-ground archaeological record yielded sherds of decorated and plain ware, worked flint and cremated human bone and earlier stone structures. Overall dimensions including cairn would have been approximately 22 yards long by 115 yards wide.

Huge orthostats, particularly those flanking the entrance to the chambers are the most obvious features of this tomb. The enormous chair shaped orthostat to the right of the entrance to the gallery makes this monument easily recognizable in photographs.

There is still plenty left to impress the visitor and it is easily recognized as a court tomb as all the most classic identifying features are here. This is a VERY nicely maintained site.

Irish exiles - the "Cuba" five

In 1871British authorities release over thirty Fenian prisoners including John Devoy and Jeremiah OøDonovan Rossa. The conditional amnesty of 1871 required those released not to return to Ireland for the term of their respective sentences for treason. Devoy, OøDonovan Rossa and three others:



Charles Underwood O¢Connell, Henry Mulleda, and John McClure boarded the S.S. Cuba bound for New York where the -Cuba Fiveøwere greeted as heroes by their Irish brethren and even receive a resolution of welcome from the US House of Representatives

Jeremiah OøDonovan Rossa ran a dynamite schoolø in the United States and boasted of bombing campaigns in his self-published newspaper. He embraced new technologies of destruction and communication, ran bombing campaigns from afar and revelled in being a hate figure in Britain.

OøDonovan Rossa is best known by Pádraig Pearseøs graveside oration at his funeral in 1915, õThey think that they have pacified Ireland. They think that they have purchased half of us and intimidated the other half. They think that they have foreseen everything, think that they have provided against everything; but, the fools, the fools, the fools! ô They have left us our Fenian dead, and while Ireland holds these graves, Ireland unfree shall never be at peace.ö

In death OøDonovan Rossa became a unifying symbol of revolutionary continuity. In life he was more divisive. What radicalized him. The answer is relatively simple: he lived through The Great Hunger. His family were annihilated in The Great Hunger. They fell from such a high position so low that they had to emigrate. He remembered his father let some friends live in their property. They had a donkey, and he was devastated when he discovered the family were forced to eat the donkey.

On another occasion he had to bury a woman in a shallow grave. He recalled putting a pillow over her head and a tea cloth over her face. He argued very prominently that to call the Famine an act of God was an act of blasphemy, that it was the British government fault.



Further, he had a secret weapon that he felt would make the difference. Developed with help from his chemistry teacher, John Patten, it was an iron-clad rocket that delivered a bomb. Their chemical powder mix and a stabilizing shaft made it steadier than anything ever seen before. They built enough of them to provide a military advantage. An interesting addendum to this story is that after the ill-fated uprising, the Brits seized the remaining rockets from Emmet apartment and sent them to Sir William Congreve, Comptroller of the Royal Arsenal. In 1805, his son claimed them as his own invention. It was those so called Congreve Rockets that produced the rockets again America and anthem when they were

fired on Fort McHenry in the War of 1812. Not only does the Bold Robert Emmet got no credit for developing the rocket. I hope that everyone has a safe and poignant holiday. I hope to see everyone at the Irish night at the Mud Hens on 15 July. God Bless the USA and God Bless Ireland. In Charity Robert McMahon.
