#### THE POTATO FAMINE. A TERRIBLE BLESSING FOR THE IRISH

If you are one of the over 34 million Irish-Americans, come hear the stories of your ancestors. Ireland awoke to the beginning of the Great Hunger in 1845. #### Important September dates in Irish History

Sept. 1, 1814 - Birth of James O'Flanagan, author, in Fermoy, Co. Cork

Sept. 1, The Wild Colonial Boy+is shot dead in a gun battle with police at Cambelltown, Sydney. Contrary to the popular song, The Wild Colonial Boy+was John Donohue, transported from Ireland in 1824

Sept. 9. 1845 - The arrival of the potato blight in Ireland is reported in the Dublin Evening Post

Sept. 9 In the liturgical calendar, this is the feast day of St. Kieran, founder of the great monastery at Clonmacnois. He dies on this date in 545.

Sept. 10, 1923 - The Irish Free State is admitted into the League of Nations

Sept. 11, 1766 - John Bligh, former MP for Athboy, who suffers from the delusion that he is a teapot, marries suddenly and unexpectedly at nearly 50 years of age. Between now and his death in 1781 he will father at least seven children, 'in spite of his initial alarm that his spout would come off in the night'

Sept. 11, 2002 - In a gesture of support and solidarity, schools, shops and businesses come to a symbolic halt at 1.46pm - the precise moment, Irish time, that the first terrorist hijacked plane hit the North Tower of the World Trade Center in NYC one year ago.

Sept. 14, 1607 - Hugh O'Neill, Ruari O'Donnell and other chiefs of their families depart Lough Swilly for the continent in what has become known as the 'Flight of the Earls"

Sept. 17, 1903 - Frank O'Connor, (pseudonym of Michael O'Donovan), short-story writer and author of poetic translations from Irish is born in Cork

Sept. 19, 1880 - Parnell delivers his famous speech at Ennis in which he introduces the term for non-violent protest - boycotting. Parnell asked his audience, 'What are you to do with a tenant who bids for a farm from which another has been evicted?' Several voices replied, 'shoot him!' Parnell answered: "I wish to point out a better way, a more Christian way which will give the lost man an opportunity of repenting. When a man takes a farm from which another has been evicted, you must shun him on the roadside, on the streets, in the shop and even in the place of worship by putting him in a "moral Coventry." You must show him your detestation of the crime he has committed"

Sept. 20, 1803 - Robert Emmet, Irish patriot, is executed in Dublin. Emmet becomes a hero of Irish nationalists, largely on the basis of his stirring speech from the dock: "Let no man write my epitaph...When my country takes her place among the nations of the earth, then, and not till then let my epitaph be written"

Sept. 24, 1880 - Mayo agent, Captain Charles Boycott, was sent to a 'moral Coventry.' He described his plight in a letter to The Times: "...people collect in crowds upon my farm and order off all my workmen. The shopkeepers have been warned to stop all supplies to my house. My farm is public property, I can get no workmen to do anything, and my ruin is openly avowed as the object of the Land League unless I throw up everything and leave the country"

#### Irish Constitution must align with values of Markievicz, not de Valera

The Irish Times Wed, Aug 15, 2018,

De Valera excluded women from politics and relegated them to domestic sphere Sinn Féin was arguably

the biggest victors of the 1918 British general election. Their triumph included the election of Constance Markievicz, the first elected female MP. In line with Sinn Féin policy, elected members refused their seats in the House of Commons but instead formed the first Dáil Éireann in 1919.

On her release from prison, Markievicz returned to Ireland and to her first sitting at the Dáil. She was nominated minister for labor, making her the first female cabinet minister in either Ireland or Britain. She proved herself effective in this role, possessing a unique way of solving employment disputes. During a particularly difficult negotiation between her and a certain employer and with no sign of an outcome. Markievicz strode through the room pulled out her gun, pointed it at the terrified employer and said, õten minutes to settle or I shootö. You will be glad to know that the employer settled within seven minutes.

Markievicz joined Fianna Fáil upon its establishment in 1926. She was elected as a Fianna Fáil candidate for Dublin South in the 1927 election. Markievicz died five weeks later, at the age of 59.

As leader of the upcoming political party, gender equality did not appear to be a central concern for Éamon de Valera. After all, he refused to accept female insurgents in the outpost that he commanded during the Easter Rising. Years later, he apparently regretted this decision, according to Hanna Sheehy Skeffington because the men had to cook their own food.

Arguably de Valera included Markievicz as a Fianna Fáil candidate not out of concern for gender balance or for her feminist politics but because he was dependent on public support. Markievicz, known as the õpeopleos countessö was an intrinsic element for Fianna Fáil to gain followers. When she died in a public ward of Sir Patrick Dunos hospital, her legacy quickly began to unfold. Due to ongoing hostilities with the Free State government, Markievicz was denied a State funeral. Her body lay in the Pillar Room of the Rotunda hospital and she received a public funeral. However, she proved to have earned the respect of the people of Ireland who lined the streets in their thousands to honor her funeral cortege.

De Valera wiped out the record of successes made by Markievicz in a very real way. When he oversaw the redrafting of the Constitution in 1937, women were positioned as inferior. Articles were inserted into that document declaring women were place as being in the domestic sphere.

Article 41.2.2, which still remains, includes a section declaring that õthe State recognizes that by her life within the home, woman gives to the State a support without which the common good cannot be achievedö. This section is only now being given consideration for replacement. Replacing this article with a gender-neutral statement would ensure that the Constitution would be more closely aligned with the values Markievicz fought hard to instill.

The release of the draft version of the Constitution did not go unnoticed by feminists in 1937. Hanna Sheehy-Skeffington was inspired to write to the Irish Independent asserting that the Constitution is õa fascist model, in which women would be relegated to permanent inferiorityö. The implications of the 1937 Constitution were far-reaching, coupled with the lack of a strong female replacement for Markievicz in Irish politics. It is essential that women are put before all children, particularly girls, so there is some sort of role model for them in political life

#### St. Kieran of Clonmacnoise



St. Kieran or Ciarán of Clonmacnoise, also known as St. Kieran the Younger, was born around 512 AD in Connacht, a town located in the northern part of Co. Roscommon. The son of Beoit, a carpenter and chariot-builder, Kieran inherited a love of learning from his mother¢s side of the family, as his maternal grandfather had been a bard, poet, and historian. Baptized by deacon Justus (õthe righteous oneö), who also served as his first tutor, the boy Kieran worked as a cattle herder. Even this early in his life, stories testifying to Kieran¢s holiness are told. Some later believed that his work as a herdsman foreshadowed the care he would offer the many who sought his wisdom.

When it was time for Kieran to leave home for the monastery of Clonard, he asked his parents for a cow to take with him as a contribution to the community. His mother refused this request, so Kieran blessed a cow of the herd, and the

cow followed him to Clonard, accompanied by her calf. Not wishing to take both the cow and the calf, Kieran used his staff to draw a line on the ground between the animals. After that, neither the cow nor the calf would cross this line, and the calf returned home. The milk provided by Kieranøs cow was reputed to amply supply all in the monastery, as well as their guests.

After completing his studies under Finnian, Kieran left Clonard and moved to the monastery of Inishmore in the Aran Isles, which was directed by St. Enda. While a member of this monastic community, Kieran was blessed with the vision of a great tree, which anticipated his own foundation of a renowned monastery. From Inishmore, Kieran went to visit his religious brothers at Isel in central Ireland. His stay here was brief, as the other monks envied his fame as a scholar, and resented what they considered his excessive charity to the poor. Asked to leave Isel, Kieran was led by a stag to Inis Aingin, or Hare Island. While he lived here for 3 years and 3 months, brothers from all over Ireland came to study under Kieran, and more miracles attested to his holiness.

During a time of famine, when it was Kieranøs turn to carry a sack of oats to the mill in order to provide a little food for the monks, he prayed that the oats would become fine wheat. While Kieran was singing the Psalms with pure heart and mind, the single sack of oats was miraculously transformed into four sacks of the best wheat. Kieran returned home and baked bread with this wheat, which the older monks said was the best they had ever tasted. These loaves not only satisfied their hunger, they were said to heal every sick person in the monastery who ate them.

Kieran departed Hare Island with eight monastic brothers, and eventually settled at a location in the center of Ireland, on the east bank of the River Shannon. Here, in the year 544, he founded the great monastery of Clonmacnoise. Students by the thousands came to study there, not only from Ireland, but also from England and France. Clonmacnoise became Irelands center of study, art, and literature. To this day, tourists and pilgrims visit the site of Kierans monastery to see some of the finest monastic ruins and high crosses in all of Ireland. A mere 7 months after establishing Clonmacnoise, Kieran died, perhaps of the plague. Because of his prominence in the early Irish church, St. Kieran is known as one of the õTwelve Apostles of Ireland.ö The Feast of St. Kieran is celebrated on September 9th.
